

**BEGINNING BIBLE CHALLENGE**  
**MONTH 2 – WEEK 6**

One of the greatest blessings for the Believer is to have a meaningful relationship with God and enjoy fellowship with Him on a daily basis. This study will help you to develop a habit of daily time with God.

Your challenge for this week is to read your Bible six days, not including time you would read it at church. This week and next two week, you will finish your journey through Psalm 119. The whole Psalm is about the Bible and the benefits of it. Read eight verses each day and answer the questions following each passage. This will help you catch the meaning of the verses and how they should change your life.

**Day 1 – Read Psalm 119:81-88.**

1. Verses 81-82 talk about the writer's desire to be comforted in his situation. His hope is lying in God's Word. What about God's Word is a comfort in times like those?

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2. Verses 84-85 continue the thought of those who wrong us. According to verse 85, what characterizes the traps the ungodly set for us?

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3. Verse 86 says that all of God's commandments are faithful or reliable. How does that help you to trust it better?

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4. According to verse 87, though the writer was almost consumed by his enemies, what did he not do?

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5. The writer asked God to quicken him or to give him new life. What would he do from that point?

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**Day 2 – Read Psalm 119:89-96.**

1. Verse 89 is an extremely encouraging verse. God's Word is settled in Heaven forever. What confidence that give you?

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2. According to verses 90-91, God's faithfulness is extended to all generations. What does that allow his servants to do?

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3. The writer told how God's Word helped him in verse 92. What commitment did he make in verse 93?

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4. In verses 94-95 the writer rehearsed the fact that he belonged to God. He asked God to save him from his enemies. What gave him the right to make that request?

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5. According to verse 96, what ended, but what remained?

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**Day 3 – Read Psalm 119:97-104.**

1. In verse 97 the writer declared his love for God’s Word. What did he do with it all day long?

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2. Verses 98-100 tell one thing that God’s Word is able to make you do. What is it?

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3. According to verse 101-102 and not depart from them, what do I need to do in order to keep God’s Word?

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4. According to verse 103, how much did the write like God’s Word?

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5. According to verse 104, how do I get understanding? What will I not like as a result?

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**Day 4 – Read Psalm 119:105-112.**

1. According to verse 105, what should guide our lives?

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2. What commitment did the writer make in verse 106?

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3. Verses 107, 109, and 110 talk again about the writer’s enemies. To what did he look during times of opposition?

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4. What did the writer offer to God in verse 108? What did he want God to do for him?

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5. Verse 111 tells us that the writer has set up God’s Word as his heritage forever. What did he do in verse 112 as a result?

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**Day 5 – Read Psalm 119:113-120.**

1. According to verse 113, what does the writer hate, and what does he love?

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2. Verses 114 tells about the protection that God and His Word can give. How can it protect you today?

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3. Verses 115, 118, and 119 tell about the fate of those who depart from God's Word. What is it?

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4. Verses 116-117 tell about the trust, confidence, and hope the writer put in God's Word. What does he not want to happen since he has done that?

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5. Verse 120 could lead us to believe that the Bible is something that should make us afraid. Fearing God is to respect Him for Who He is and to like and dislike the same things He does. In what area do you need to change your thinking today so it is more in line with God's Word and His desires?

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**Day 6 – Read Psalm 119:121-128.**

1. In verses 121-122 the writer states that he has done what is right. What does he ask God to do for Him in light of that?

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2. According to verse 123, how intently was the writer looking for God's Word?

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3. Verses 124-125 give the writer's requests as God's servant. What are they?

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4. The writer tells of the condition of some people in verse 126 that they have regarded God's Word as void or worthless. What did he ask God to do in light of that?

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5. Verses 127-128 describe the writer's value and conviction about the Bible. What is it?

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
